IMPACTS ON GATEWAY COMMUNITIES

Communities that are adjacent to National Park Systems, referred to as gateway communities, benefit from the nearby public lands. These communities often expand after a monument designation occurs, they help create jobs, increase revenue, and expand businesses.

- In 2007, all businesses near the Great Allegheny Passage (GAP) trail attributed to a revenue of \$32,614,703 and distributed \$6,273,927 in wages.
- A study of Maryland's Northern Central Rail Trail found the state received \$303,000/year in trail-related tax income while the trail's management and maintenance costs were \$192,000/year.
- Since the Katy Hiking and Biking Trail opened in Marthasville, Missouri, more than a dozen new businesses have opened. The western half of the trail generates \$3 million annually in local revenue.

LACK OF DIVERSITY IN PUBLIC LANDS

Access to economic benefits from public lands has been historically limited to communities of color. This is exemplified in the lack of representation within jobs.



More than 80% of the National Park Service's employees are white.

VALUE OF DIVERSITY

- Monuments dedicated to diverse cultures are beneficial for moral and economic reasons. For
 example, the Selma to Montgomery National Historic Trail has generated \$38.3 million and serves
 to commemorate the fight for racial justice.
- Increase representation of underrepresented histories encourages increased representation of underrepresented visitors.
